

It is your right to document suspected ICE activity.

- Use SALUTE to gather specific information about what you are seeing: Size, Activity, Location, Uniform, Time, Equipment
 - Example: SPOTTED @ Driggs Ave and Lorimer St, 12:50pm, 3 masked agents standing across the street in vests that say "police" with handcuffs
- Take videos/photos of agents, vehicles, and interactions with civilians
- Call or text the SALUTE information and photos/videos to NYC's hotline: (229) 304-8720
- If someone is being detained, attempt to get their full name and emergency contact

Questions to discuss with your football community to get organized

- What do we do if ICE shows up at our park during pick up next week?
- Are any of the friends we play with at risk for racial profiling/detainment?
- Have any of us done Know Your Rights or Deportation Defense trainings?
- Are there any established Ice Watch groups in the neighborhoods where we play?
- Have I talked to my other football friends about ICE and the World Cup?

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A KYR GUIDE FOR NYC FOOTBALLERS

In NYC, as in many cities around the world, football is an immigrant sport. Its language is universal; its ability to transcend borders is irrefutable. For many recently arrived folks, the pitch provides a place for community-building, comfort, and joy in a city which they are denied even the most basic human decency.

In January 2026, it was reported that two Manhattan Celtic football players were detained by ICE after their training session at Pier 40 Hudson River Park. They were released after club representatives intervened, but many others may not have the same support from community organizations. ICE's presence near those fields is not surprising considering the Hudson River Park Trust have maintained a series of parking contracts with DHS since 2004, including an ongoing five-year contract with ICE which is due to expire in June. ICE's attempted targeting of football players and of pitches as a tool for surveillance and detainment is painful.

With the upcoming World Cup, football will be everywhere. Simultaneously, increased surveillance and both federal and local policing will accompany this world event, especially in host cities. Already in February, ICE's Acting Director, Todd Lyons, stated that the agency will play a "key part" in the tournament's "overall security apparatus." Now more than ever, organizing your soccer community, whether an official league or an informal pickup crew, is paramount. We keep us safe on and off the pitch.

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Know Your Rights in Public Spaces

ICE can approach and question people in public spaces such as outdoor pitches, parks, and indoor fields **without** a judicial warrant. To detain you, they only need "reasonable suspicion". As we've seen recently, this could be the language you speak or the color of your skin. **But, you still have rights.**

- DON'T SPEAK: You have the right to remain silent. You don't have to answer questions.
 - Ask: "Am I being detained?" Repeat this question until you get an answer. If the answer is NO, walk away calmly.
- DON'T SHOW: You do not need to show any type of ID.
- DON'T SIGN: Do not sign any documents without speaking to a lawyer first.



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
